



You can study the following types of course at Teesside University:

INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION YEAR

120 CREDITS

(includes English language)

A one-year course that combines English language with some subject-specific modules, for example:

- > Foundation Year (Health)
- International Foundation Year (Social Sciences and Law)
- International Foundation Year (Business and Computing) is available as a four month course commencing in January, for those with a sufficiently high level of English.

FOUNDATION YEAR (HEALTH)

120 CREDITS

(includes English language)

A one-year course that combines English language with health subject-specific modules. This is ideal if you are progressing from high school or college and don't meet the entry requirements for undergraduate courses in health.

FREE ENGLISH LANGUAGE SUPPORT FOR ALL INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

All international students complete an English language test on arrival to assess your level. You are then placed on a course of academic English and study skills for up to 20 hours, depending on your level. You complete the course alongside your degree programme. It helps you improve your general and academic English ability - and is completely free of charge.









ENGLISH LANGUAGE COURSES

Teesside University is accredited by the British Council as an English language training provider.



Pre-sessional courses are essential if you need to improve your English level before starting your degree. They help you to develop your English language skills and prepare you for living and studying in the UK. They are also an opportunity to make friends and get to know the local area before you start your degree programme.

The full course lasts 26 weeks but has graded entry points throughout the year. The minimum entry requirements for each entry date are given below (for students who require IELTS 5.5 or 6 and IELTS 6.5 for University entry)



DEPOSIT FOR SELF-FUNDING INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

- > If you are an international student funding your own studies, you must pay a deposit of £4,000. Once you have paid your deposit and met all of the conditions for entry to your course the University request the necessary documentation from you to assign your Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) number which enables you to apply for a Student Visa. We confirm the required deposit in your conditional offer.
- > Your deposit will not be refunded once your visa is issued.
- > If you are refused a visa, we refund your deposit to the original payee.

PAYMENT TERMS FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

- > You can pay fees in up to seven monthly instalments.
- > If you are studying at the University full time and pay in full before you enrol, you are entitled to a £500 early payment discount.
- > Please note for students enrolling on a two-year master's degree, paying £7,500 a year, you are entitled to a £500 discount for the first year of study only. To receive this discount you must pay your fee prior to

SPONSORED STUDENTS

- > Your sponsor needs to confirm by letter that they are paying your fees before we can issue your CAS. We only accept letters from approved sponsors.





APPLYING TO ARRIVING PROCESS

1. DO YOUR RESEARCH

- > Consider: course content, career goals, course delivery, costs, location
- > Discuss with family, friends, teachers
- > Search courses and study destinations online.

2. MAKE A SHORTLIST

- > Decide on your preferred universities and courses
- > Arrange to talk to university staff
- > Visit if possible or attend a virtual open day if available.

3. APPLY

- > Apply directly on our website, through one of our regional offices, through an agent in your local area
- > Alternatively, you could apply through UCAS if you prefer, undergraduate courses only
- Include as much of the required documentation and information as possible, including your qualifications, a copy of your passport and full details of any previous UK study/visas along with your consent for us to contact UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) about this
- > Advanced entry if you are applying for second or third year entry to an undergraduate degree programme, you must include your university or college transcripts. Remember to indicate the year of entry for which you want to be considered.

4. SELECTION PROCESS

- > Wait for a response
- > We will let you know the outcome of your application by email.
- > The outcome will either be an unconditional academic offer, a conditional offer, meaning you have to provide us with more information, or confirmation that we cannot offer you a place
- > Please remember that a thorough and clearly presented application, providing as much of the required information as possible, will help speed up the time needed to review your application.

5. MEET ACADEMIC CONDITIONS

- If you have been asked to provide more evidence to support your application, you should submit this as soon as possible. This could include:
 - · Transcripts or mark sheets
 - Evidence of your English level
 - Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS) certificate if relevant
- If you have any questions about how to meet your academic conditions or if you feel there is something which may delay your application, for example, availability of dates or access to English language tests, contact us immediately to seek advice.

6. ACCEPT YOUR OFFER

- > Once you have received your unconditional academic offer and are sure that Teesside is the right place for you, you should let us know that you accept the offer
- > You should formally accept your offer before the date indicated on your offer letter
- > You can accept your unconditional academic offer without paying your deposit
- > Accepting your offer also allows you to apply for accommodation.

7. PAY YOUR DEPOSIT

- > Your place at Teesside University will only be fully-confirmed once you have paid your deposit
- > You should pay your deposit at the same time as accepting your unconditional academic offer, or as soon as possible afterwards
- > If you are later refused a visa, your deposit will be refunded.









8. CAS (CONFIRMATION OF ACCEPTANCE FOR STUDIES)

- > If you require a Student Visa to study in the UK, you will need to submit a CAS (Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies) with your visa application
- > After you have paid your deposit or provided us with a copy of your sponsor letter, if you have met all your academic conditions, we will send you a Confirmation of Offer Details letter
- > The letter will contain all your details as they will appear in your CAS, so please ensure you check them thoroughly and let us know immediately if something is incorrect. Incorrect details on your CAS could affect your visa application
- > Once you have received your Confirmation of Offer Details letter from us, we can consider you for a CAS
- > You will need to provide us with some more information by completing a credibility survey, UKVI checks and maintenance checks
- > If you successfully complete all the necessary checks, we can then issue your CAS
- > Your CAS cannot be generated more than six months prior to your course start date
- > You need to include your CAS number when you apply for your visa but you do not need to provide an original copy of the CAS document.

9. APPLY FOR A VISA

- > For most countries you need to apply online for your visa. There are a few exceptions, so you need to check the Home Office website www.gov.uk/student-visa
- > Once you have your CAS, you can complete and submit your Student Visa application
- > If you applied through an agent, they may also be able to help you apply for your visa.

Credibility interview

- > You may be asked to participate in a credibility interview as part of the Student Visa application process
- > This can happen whether you are applying from within the UK or overseas
- > The purpose of the interview is for UKVI to ensure that you are a genuine student and have credible reasons for coming to study at a UK university
- > The interview will probably take place at the embassy or the visa application centre where you apply.

Immigration health surcharge

- > When you apply for a visa, you have to pay a healthcare surcharge for each person coming to the UK. Those on a Student Visa and their dependants have to pay £470 per year for each person. The exact amount that you pay depends on the amount of leave that you are granted
- > This fee is subject to change. Please check www.gov.uk/healthcare-immigration-application for the most up to date cost.

10. BOOK YOUR TRAVEL

- > If you are successful in your visa application, you can then book your flights
- > As soon as you have booked your travel, you should also let us know about your travel plans and register for our free meet and greet service, to collect you from a local airport and take you to your accommodation on arrival: tees.ac.uk/international/meet

11. PREPARE

- > The more you prepare, the easier it will be for you to settle into your new life at Teesside University
- > Look out for email updates and useful information from us, and let us know if you need any extra help
- > If possible, attend a pre-departure event at a local office, agent office, or online.

12. ENROLMENT AND ORIENTATION

- > Check the dates for our orientation weekend and make sure you travel in time for the event: tees.ac.uk/international/orientation
- > You will make the best possible start to your course and have all the help you need to settle in when you take part in our orientation and enrolment programme
- > As well as being an important part of the induction process, our orientation weekend is a great opportunity to meet other students, make friends and see the local area.

YOU CHOOSE

EQUIPMENT

If you don't want to bring your own equipment in your luggage, you can order and pay for bedding packs (sheets, pillow, and duvet), kitchen packs (cutlery, crockery, and pan) and discounted catering vouchers before you arrive. We send details with your accommodation offer.

FACILITIES

In University-owned accommodation you have facilities to do your own cooking and laundry. You can rent for a 40/45/50-week period (apart from Parkside Halls which is 40 weeks only). Heating, lighting, student bedroom insurance and free internet access are included in the cost. The residences are mixed, open to both men and women. However, there are separate groups of rooms for males

COSTS

We have some of the most affordable University-managed accommodation in the UK. Rents for 2021-22 vary from £65 a week (£2,600 an academic year) to £125 per week (£5,000 an academic year) for a single room in halls of residence. Please note, an academic year is 40 weeks of accommodation. For contracts of 45 or 50 weeks this cost increases. Our campus is a safe and friendly place where you will soon feel at home. 

TYPICAL LIVING COSTS IN MIDDLESBROUGH

You will find that Middlesbrough has lower living costs than many cities in the UK. We have accommodation, shops and entertainment to suit all budgets.



You need to allow approximately £1,023 a month for living costs for the duration of your course. You must also make sure that you have enough money to pay for your full course fees.

Choose from University-managed halls, houses or flats on campus or University-managed houses in the private sector – all within walking distance.

Renting in University residences costs from £65 a week (£2,600 a year) to £125 a week (£5,000 a year) for a single room for a 40-week period.

While you are living away from your family and home country, you should be prepared to have different spending patterns to those you are used to in your home country.


This guide provides information about some of the expenses you might need to consider in your life as a student in the UK.

Please note: this information is not exact and is only intended to help you estimate your living costs. Your costs also depend on the decisions you make about your lifestyle in the UK, for example, the type of place you want to live in and the kinds of activities you want to do while you are here.

Undergraduate students should budget for nine months (when studying a September – May course) and postgraduates for 12 months.

There are lots of supermarkets and independent shops close to the University where you can buy good quality, inexpensive food. Budget for around £140 a month, although costs vary depending on which shops you go to. It is more expensive if you eat a lot of meals in cafés or restaurants.

Middlesbrough town centre has many shops to buy toiletries such as shampoo, soap, toothpaste and basic household products like cleaning sprays and washing-up liquids for £1 or less. You should probably budget £20 - £30 a month for these items, but you may spend more if you choose expensive brands.

CLOTHING



As in all towns and cities, you can find clothing in many different price ranges, so it is difficult to give an accurate estimate of how much you will typically spend. There are many shops where you can find inexpensive clothing in Middlesbrough. As a guide, you might want to budget around £40 a month to cover the basics.

TV LICENCE



In the UK, every household with a TV must pay for a TV licence which is £159 at time of publishing. Even if you are in University halls and watching TV, or programmes on a device such as a laptop or mobile phone in your room, you must buy a TV licence. You can pay this online by direct debit at tvlicensing.co.uk. You can make one payment, or pay in monthly or quarterly instalments.

UTILITIES



In University-owned accommodation, utilities, heating, lighting and internet are included in the price. If you stay in private accommodation, you could pay in the range of $\mathfrak{L}60$ - $\mathfrak{L}90$ a month, depending on how big the house is and how many people are sharing.

MOBILE PHONE



You can pay from around £10 a month for a SIM-only contract and up to £55 a month for a full contract including a handset. Prices vary depending on the network and contract. We recommend you check comparison websites such as comparethemarket.com to compare and find the right deal.

HOME INSURANCE



We recommend that you arrange home contents insurance to cover items like mobile phones, laptops and tablets, bikes, keys and jewellery. The insurance cost depend on the items you need to cover. You might want to budget around £20 a month for insurance.

LOCAL TRAVEL



Because you will be living and studying within a small area in the town centre, you probably do not need to budget for daily travel costs as everything is within walking distance. A weekly bus pass costs £16.50 for visiting areas outside the town centre. The train station is also within walking distance with routes countrywide. You can pay £30 a year for a student railcard to get a third off ticket prices.

SPORT, ENTERTAINMENT AND LEISURE



Teesside University has excellent sports facilities with a climbing wall, fitness studio, sauna, steam room, exercise classes, squash and badminton courts, and the gym. Membership is £40 per semester and must be renewed at the start of each semester or you can pay £3.50 per session.



Student discounts are available on cinema tickets at Middlesbrough's Cineworld cinema – student tickets cost from under £10. Prices may vary.



The Students' Union also hosts a huge amount of clubs ranging from football and rugby to the more adrenalin-fuelled skydiving and gymnastics.



The University is located in the centre of Middlesbrough with so many local restaurants that will suit your taste – from Indian and Chinese to Arabic and Malaysian. You will pay around £10 for a basic one-course meal.



Middlesbrough has extremely good bus and train lines to connect you directly to the spectacular North York Moors and London, and many places in between.



Tees Barrage International White Water Centre is a very short drive away and offers a range of exciting water sports-from £43 for white water rafting experience.

RESEARCH DEGREES

We offer research degrees at Master of Philosophy (MPhil) and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) level. Postgraduate research students are a vital part of our research community and benefit from working with specialists in their respective fields who have national and international reputations and excellent commercial links. We are committed to ensuring that the quality and relevance of your postgraduate research studies are of the highest level and will equip you with advanced skills and expertise, applicable to academia or industry. A full-time research student is expected to spend approximately 35 hours a week (part-time around 15 hours a week) on research and undertaking research skills training.

Registration periods

MPhil Full-time, 1-2 years Part-time, 2-3 years PhD Full-time, 3-4 years Part-time, 4-7 years

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Normal minimum entry requirements are a UK upper second-class honours degree (2.1) or higher, or an approved overseas equivalent in a related subject. If English is not your first language you should have, or expect to obtain, no grade lower than 6.5 in the IELTS English language test. If you don't meet this minimum entry requirement, you can take one of our presessional courses, as long as your IELTS level is at least 4.0.

HOW TO APPLY

You can apply online for a research degree at any time; our enrolment dates for new research degree students are in October, December, March and May. To apply for a research degree you will need to develop a research proposal and personal statement.

Applications are welcome from International students. International students will be subject to the standard entry criteria relating to English language ability, ATAS clearance and, where relevant, UK visa requirements and procedures.

All PGR students are supported by their own team of supervisors (lead by a Director of Studies) who will have extensive expertise in your area of interest and be able to provide guidance throughout your degree. Therefore, before you apply for a research degree it is important that you decide on a subject area and identify a supervisor. You can explore our areas of expertise and potential supervisors using a keyword search on our research portal.
